Based on the work of Ahmed Karadawi, this book discusses Sudanese government policy towards the refugee flows from Ethiopia into the Eastern Region of Sudan in the period 1967 to 1984, arguing that there were two underlying assumptions behind successive governments' policies: that refugees were considered a security threat and a socio-economic burden. In response, the policies incorporated the Organization of African Unity norms, which offered a platform to depoliticize the refugees, equally with the international conventions relating to refugees, which assured the externalization of responsibility and access to aid.

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



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



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
